Department Mission



We heard from their loved ones who stood by and supported them during the long hours, nights, and weekends these jobs take to deliver the highest quality services to residents.

...We heard from young people that they are able to stay at E. G. Stocks Basketball Courts later into the evening with their friends now that the courts have lights.

...We heard from over 1,000 Bristol residents about their hopes and dreams for a new playground at Seymour Park; helping us pick the design and play elements that will endure for the next generation of young people in our city.

These stories tell our impact. Way more than numbers ever will. This is why the theme of this year's Annual Report is one of stories. We hope you read on and enjoy!

Aquatics

Aquatic programs include introductory, intermediate, and advanced swim lessons that promote water safety, exercise, and therapeutic classes to help residents meet their health goals.

Case Management

Park Maintenance





PARK PROJECTS

BPRYCS parks and facilities are award-winning, nationally recognized and amongst the top municipal park systems in New England. Over a dozen park improvement projects were completed in 2023 including the establishment of a 66-acre passive park with the opening of Pigeon Hill Preserve, major renovations at E.G. Stocks, and a brand new pickleball court facility at Seymour Park- the first of its kind in Bristol.



E. G. Stocks 2023 Renovation- 2023 Connecticut Recreation and Parks Association Award Winning Park

The 2020 Comprehensive Parks Master Plan identified a significant number of deficiencies at E. G. Stocks including outdated and dangerous playground equipment, underutilized splash park, general lack of accessible pathways, outdated lighting system and more. Major renovations were completed in 2023 which included installation of a brand-new state of the art playground and splash park, basketball court resurfacing, and energy efficient LED light systems for both the volleyball courts and basketball courts. ADA accessible upgrades were made in the parking lot and along the sidewalks to ensure equitable and inclusive access to all of the park amenities. Finally, two blue light towers were installed to honor our Fallen Bristol Police Officers who were tragically killed in the line of duty in October of 2022. E. G. Stocks was awarded the 2023 Facility of Merit Award by the Connecticut Recreation and Parks Association.

Stewardship & Conservation Projects

- Pigeon Hill Preserve: A new 66-acre passive open space park was opened on Shrub Road which includes an extensive trail system connecting to the Barnes Nature Center. The property is co-managed with the Environmental Learning Centers of Connecticut.
- Urban Garden on Veterans Memorial Boulevard: Long standing blighted tennis courts were removed from the Veterans Memorial Boulevard to make way for more green space. Designed by the department's Landscape Gardener Steven Schriver, the Urban Garden includes twenty-one native trees and over forty shrubs that infiltrate storm water, improve air quality, and reduce ambient temperatures. This project was funded through the CT Urban Forest Council grant provided by the Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection Division of Forestry and the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative.
- Kern Park Renovations: Thanks to the American Rescue Plan Funds renovations for passive improvements to Kern Park are expected to commenced this fall. Improvements include trail enhancements, a formal entrance on Sims Road, educational signage and replacing the blighted tennis courts with a pollinator garden.
- Community Garden 51 High Street: Community Services Coordinator Aubrey Minkler worked with Building Maintenance staff to develop a community garden in front of the BPRYCS Main Offices on 51 High Street. Fresh produce is available for families in need during the summer and fall months.
- Rain Garden at Mrs. Rockwell Pavilion: The BPRYCS team planted a new rain garden along Mrs. Rockwell Pavilion and the bathroom expansion completed in 2022. The gardens help collect rain and runoff from the building.



PARK PROJECTS



Seymour Park- Home to the City's First Outdoor Pickleball Courts

In the summer of 2023, we opened the city's first dedicated outdoor pickleball courts at Seymour Park. Pickleball is the country's fastest growing sport for the third year in a row and there is a reported 36.5 million pickleball players in the United States. The courts will soon be complimented with an additional lighted pickleball facility at Page Park over the next few years.

Seymour Park basketball courts were also rebuilt and a new playground is slated to be installed in early 2024; selected by over 1,000 voters in the online Upgrade Your Play social media campaign.

Facility Upgrades and Enhancements

- Pine Lake Adventure Park: Major upgrades to Pine Lake were completed this year including installation of a new climbing tower, storage sheds, a renovated parking lot, bathroom facility and a new main entrance sign and garden. Pine Lake Adventure Park is slated to be re-opened to the public in 2024.
- Perry Spinelli Pavilion: Phase 2 renovations were completed which included new lighting, building sign, and window replacements. A grand re-opening of the facility is expected in 2024 which will include rentals for birthday parties, weddings and graduations.
- Veterans Memorial Boulevard Bridge: Major bridge improvements were completed for the grand entrance of the VMB. Thank you to the City of Bristol Department of Public Works for leading this project.
- Ed Swicklas Employee Garden: A new monument was installed at Rockwell Park to honor retired employees that served the Parks, Recreation, Youth and Community Services Department for 15 or more years.
- Wilson's Field Basketball Courts: Resurfacing the courts addressed safety concerns posed by eroding surface conditions and cracks, allowing safer and expanded play opportunities.
- Muzzy Field Picnic Pavilion: A new shaded picnic pavilion was installed at Muzzy Field to be utilized by the Bristol Blues and other organizations hosting parties and gatherings at the stadium. Thank you to our own Parks Crew for their installation work.



Page Park Revitalization

Substantial design, development and permitting work for the Page Park Revitalization project was completed in 2023. Site improvements include new parking lots, splash park, playground, trail system, pickleball courts, basketball courts and more. Construction for the Page Park improvements are anticipated to begin in mid-to-late 2024.

Launching of Downtown Live at Rockwell Theater

After nearly a decade of planning, BPRYCS proudly launched Downtown Live at the Rockwell Theater, the City of Bristol's premier entertainment venue for music, comedy and more. Situated in the Bristol Arts and Innovation Magnet School (BAIMS) the Rockwell Theater boasts stunning architecture along with a cozy atmosphere, seating 620 patrons. Downtown Live at the Rockwell Theater features monthly entertainers from live musical and dance performances, to comedy shows, education and lecture series, children's series, and so much more. 2023 National Gold Medal Award Finalist - Second year in a row!

BPRYCS was honored again as a finalist for the 2023 National Gold Medal Awards for Excellence in Park and Recreation Management by the American Academy for Park and Recreation Administration (AAPRA), in partnership with the National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA). This is the second straight year BPRYCS has been named a finalist, competing amongst the best park agencies from across the country.

The National Gold Medal Award honors public park and recreation agencies and state park systems throughout the United States and armed forces recreation programs worldwide that demonstrate excellence in long-range planning, resource management and innovative approaches to delivering superb park and recreation services with fiscally sound business practices.



The Bristol Blues Baseball Renewed their Contract for Another Three Years.

The Board of Park Commissioners renewed a contract with the Bristol Blues Baseball (BBB) to extend their program at Muzzy Field through 2025. BBB has become imbedded in the community and is one of Bristol's most anticipated recreational activities during the summer season.



Youth & Community Services Strategic Planning Results in Creation of New Guiding Pillars

The Youth & Community Services Division embarked on strategic planning work in 2023 which resulted in the Youth Commission adopting 3 foundational pillars to guide the work of the staff over the coming years. The pillars include supporting positive mental health, servicing basic needs and empowering youth. Programs and services are developed based on their impact for uplifting the new pillars.

City Arts & Culture Commission Launches Inaugural Cultural District Celebration

In 2022, the City of Bristol received a Cultural District Designation from the State of Connecticut Department of Economics and Community Development for its downtown district. An annual celebration event was planned by the City Arts and Culture Commission to uplift the district and promote local arts, culture, and businesses. The event included musical entertainment, food truck, live painting, caricatures, poetry and a wide array of diverse art work.

Chairman of the City Arts and Culture Commission Walter Lewandoski remarked, “We are so privileged and excited to be able to shine the spotlight on our newly recognized Cultural District.”

Arts and Culture Supervisor Arianna Therriault shared, “As one of only five designated Cultural Districts in Connecticut, Bristol’s passion for continuously advancing the art, dining and history is truly amazing.” Therriault remarked the Celebration was, “the first of many with the goal of sharing our culture and learning about all the amenities the district has to offer.”

Street signs promoting the Cultural District were installed throughout the downtown area.



Youth & Prevention Awards Program Continues to Grow

The Youth Commission’s Annual Youth & Prevention Leader Awards night continues to grow each year. In May 2023 BPRYCS honored over 230 young people for their outstanding volunteerism and contributions to the Bristol community. The future looks bright with so many young people stepping up and giving back!



BEST Drug Free Communities Visibility Campaign

Since starting at the end of 2022, Bristol Eliminating Substance Use Together (BEST) Program Coordinator Michael Tingley and the BEST Coalition has been engaged in a year long campaign to increase visibility and message awareness of the drug free communities program. This has included six billboards, over 55 lawn signs installed throughout the city, monthly Narcan trainings, and tabling at 24 community events. BEST has also cemented strong holdings within the Bristol Public School system to ensure critical information is reaching students.



All-Staff Engagement Summit Helps Launch Internal Development Priorities

An All-Staff Engagement Summit was held in August 2023 which created space for staff to come together to build comradery, discuss department challenges, and develop solutions. Nearly 95% of staff reported having a satisfactory experience with the summit. Outcomes from the summit will guide the Leadership Team’s efforts over the coming months.

Dinner on the Diamond- Annual Fundraiser Continues to Grow!

The BPRYCS premier fundraising event, Dinner on the Diamond doubled its attendance and sponsorships for the 2023 event which raised \$13,000. Proceeds of the event go to the Friends of Bristol Parks and Recreation Fund through the Main Street Community Foundation which supports parks and recreation projects and initiatives that benefit the Bristol community. Planning is already underway for the 3rd Annual Dinner on the Diamond slated for May 13, 2024.



School Fields Maintenance and Management Transferred to Parks Division

A long-standing community priority was realized this year with the creation of the Board of Education School Fields Maintenance and Management Plan, adopted by the Board of Park Commissioners in May 2023. The plan transfers scheduling and maintenance functions of the middle school and elementary school fields to the jurisdiction of BPRYCS. This phased plan will advance strategic goals established in the 2020 Master Plan to bring online more playable fields and create efficiencies around centralized field management.



BPRYCS Superintendent Dr. Josh Medeiros Elected Chair of the National Directors School

BPRYCS Superintendent Josh Medeiros was elected to serve as Chair of the prestigious National Recreation and Parks Association (NRPA) Directors School. NRPA Directors School is an exclusive two-year professional development program that prepares new and upcoming parks and recreation directors to be effective leaders. Medeiros has served the past two years as a faculty member at the school where he instructed courses on master and strategic planning, capital improvement planning, politics and advocacy. Unanimously elected by his fellow faculty members, Medeiros will oversee the management and administration of the Directors School as well as continue to serve as a faculty member. Directors School 2024 is slated for March 2-8, 2024 in Denver, Colorado. Medeiros serves in a volunteer capacity with all expenses paid by the national association.



BPRYCS Training Program saves a Life!

Summer Fun Camp Assistant Director Jalen Benoit applied his CPR/First Aid Skills he learned at BPRYCS summer orientation training when he performed abdominal thrusts on a co-worker who was choking. For his heroic response, Jalen was presented the City's All Heart Award by Mayor Jeff Caggiano and Superintendent Medeiros at the July City Council.

New Recreation Program Assistant Shines Bright

Recreation Program Assistant, Madison Fostervold, joined the BPRYCS team full time in March of this year. Madison was awarded the Dorothy G. Mullen/George-Sanford Student Scholarship Award by the CT Recreation and Parks Association at their 63rd Annual Conference and Tradeshow in November. Madison is a Master's Student in the Recreation Administration program at Southern Connecticut State University.
